It Pays to be Prepared: know the signs of canine choking

There's a reason we have a rule at our house that the dogs must eat while we're home and they don't free feed at their own will.

Ziva, our powered-sugar-faced-twelveyear-old-Great Dane, had just finished eating breakfast when she wandered into the living room. I looked up and immediately knew something wasn't right. At first I thought she was reverse sneezing, a common condition also known as paroxysmal respiration, in which the "airflow is inward and the opening (glottis) to the windpipe (trachea) is closed. The dog will typically be in a standing position with the neck extended, the head tilted backward, and the elbows pointing outward." (reference: https://www.vet.cornell.edu/departments -centers-and-institutes/riney-caninehealth-center/canine-healthinformation/reverse-sneezing) However, in this case, it didn't appear that air was getting in or out of our aged girl.

Luckily for our sweet girl, I had taken a pet first aid class years ago, and flashbacks to training immediately kicked in. I was able to quickly remove the obstruction in her throat and found that she had been choking on 4 pieces of kibble that were lodged in her airway.



We highly recommend talking to your veterinarian about what to do in the case of canine choking and to take a pet first aid class to know the proper procedures and practices for this type of emergency. Believe it or not, there is such thing as the canine Heimlich maneuver and it does differ between large and small dogs.

Dogs choke on food, toys, and objects a lot more often than you might think. Statistics from the American Veterinary Medical Association (AVMA) indicate that roughly 200,000 dogs a year in the US experience choking emergencies.

The good news is that choking is preventable. Do your best to reduce the risk of choking in your canine companions with the following:

- Do not allow your dogs to eat unsupervised
- Regularly inspect your dog's toys and discard any toys that have become damaged, cracked or have loose pieces
- Choose safe toys and make sure they aren't provided toys that splinter or break into small pieces



- Pick toys that have at least two holes in them; it helps to prevent suction by allowing airflow
- Always supervise playtime and toy chew-time
- Keep all small objects, medications, and other choking hazards out of reach from your pup
- Most importantly, act fast in the case of choking. Ensure to familiarize yourself with the signs of choking, and how to perform the Heimlich maneuver and how to remove an obstruction from your dog's airway

 - Dog stops breathing
 - Anxiousness or acting frantic
 - Blue or white gums
 - Loud breathing sounds
 - Pawing at the mouth
 - Struggling or gasping for breath

Did you know?

"Basal breeds" are known as dog breeds that are considered to have a relatively ancient lineage and have changed very little over time. Some examples include: Basenjis, Afghan hounds, Chow chows, Shiba Inus, Salukis, Akitas, and one of my favorites, the New Guinea Singing Dog.

New Guinea Singing Dogs, also known as Canis lupus hallstromi, are found in the highlands on the island of New Guinea in the southwestern Pacific Ocean. While they may look very similar to the Australian Dingo, as they are closely related, they have a few distinct features. The first of which, is what gives them their name. Instead of barking, they have an unusual "yodel" as a vocalization. They are also one of the few breeds in the world who are known to climb trees!
